
#### **BACKGROUND & OVERVIEW**

- Program based on Senate Bill 1339
  - signed by Governor in fall 2012
- Authorizes Air District & MTC to jointly adopt a regional commuter benefits ordinance
- Modeled on local ordinances in several Bay Area cities
- Program must be approved by Air District Board of Directors
   & MTC Commission in order to take effect
- Pilot program: 2014-2016
- Report to Legislature due by July 2016

# **PURPOSE / OBJECTIVES**

- Reduce motor vehicle trips to worksites
- Reduce traffic congestion
- Improve air quality
- Reduce emissions of greenhouse gases
- Take advantage of federal commuter tax benefits
- Expand the number of employers that make commuter benefits available to their employees
- Provide tax savings to employers & employees
- Level the playing field; expand best practices

#### **EMPLOYERS CAN INFLUENCE MODE CHOICE**




#### **APPLICABILITY**

#### **Employers with 50+ full-time employees in Bay Area:**

- Private business
- Public agency
- Non-profit organization

# **Employee count based on all Bay Area worksites combined**

 Including branch locations with less than 50 employees



#### FOUR COMMUTER BENEFIT OPTIONS

- Option 1: Pre-tax payroll deduction for transit or vanpool
- Option 2: Direct subsidy for transit or vanpool
- Option 3: Employer-provided transportation
- Option 4: Alternative commuter benefit







# **PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS**

#### Key requirements:

- Select one of the four commuter benefit options
- Designate a commuter benefits coordinator
- Register with Air District/MTC
- Notify employees & make benefit available
- Provide information needed for Program evaluation

#### **COMMUTER BENEFITS PROGRAM ELEMENTS**

- New rule (Regulation 14, Rule 1) to serve as foundation for Program
- Guidelines to explain Program options & requirements
- Employer assistance via MTC 511.org program
- Web-based registration system & employer database

#### Objective:

- Make it easy for employers to comply
- Minimize administrative requirements

### **PUBLIC OUTREACH**

- Outreach to stakeholders: employers, benefit administrators, congestion management agencies, transit agencies
- Meetings & presentations with numerous employer groups throughout the Bay Area
- Issued draft rule & workshop report in late August
- Public workshops in all nine Bay Area counties in October 2013 to get input on draft Program

# **PROCESS & TIMELINE**

Task / Milestone	Time Frame
Issue Notice of Public Hearing: - Proposed Rule (Regulation 14, Rule 1) - Staff Report - Socio-economic analysis - CEQA doc (Initial Study/Negative Declaration)	January 2014
Deadline for public comments on proposed rule docs	(30 days)
Air District Board hearing	March 5 or March 19
Concurrence by MTC Commission	March 26
Implementation of Program	Begin April 2014
Employers choose option & implement program	6 months to comply

- Better air quality

- Employees save on transit/vanpool fares
  - both existing & new riders
- Enhanced employee benefits
- Reduced traffic congestion
